

FSL Does Work for the Adkins Group At William B. Meyer Co. in Windsor

When moving and records management company William B. Meyer needed to expand their presence in the Hartford area, they contacted the Adkins Group for their building expertise-and for the top quality work that they do.

TIPS & TRICKS: Prepare Your Outdoors For Spring & Summer

While beautiful weather may lure you to start your gardening, early season preparation and planning will lead to I much greater returns later in the season. We have prepared a series of tips to ensure your garden/lawn is in top shape throughout the season:

- ☑ Get a Soil PH Test. Go to ☑ www.fourseasonsland.com and download the soil submission form, or call 860.683.4977(Exp Station phone number)
- \square Trim the Trees and Limbs. Hire an ☑ arborist and remove the overhanging tree limbs and dead wood.
- $\mathbf{\nabla}$ Clean birdbaths and feeders. (really!)
- $\mathbf{\nabla}$ Check for signs of growth. Did you remember to plant snow crocus last fall? If not, cut forsythia or magnolia branches to bring inside for forcing.
- $\mathbf{\nabla}$ Prep the beds. Remove winter mulch or, if well composted, work into the top layer of the soil. Work

in some leaf mold or well-rooted manure, too, $\mathbf{\nabla}$

- Prune Fruit Trees. Now is the time to trim fruit trees if you didn't prune in winter. Prune before buds begin ☑ to break into bloom or you'll stress the tree and get a tiny crop (or possibly none).
- Perform basic maintenance. Check stonework for frost heaves. ☑ Check and clean the deck now so you don't have to do it later; make any repairs.
- Plant veggies. Hardy vegetables, Late Spring: such as onions, potatoes, artichokes, and some lettuces, ☑ should be planted now.
- Divide perennials. Before plants $\mathbf{\nabla}$ have begun spring growth is a good time to divide many perennials. Share some divisions with your friends this year.
- Build new beds. Every gardener $\mathbf{\nabla}$ needs more beds. This year, put in a flowering shrub bed supplemented with perennials and

annuals.

- Stop feeding the birds. Take down and clean feeders, put them away until fall.
- Enjoy the spring show. Resolve to plant more spring-flowering bulbs next fall.
- \square Plant hardy annuals. Sow seeds outdoors or transplant seedlings.
- Apply mulch and more mulch. If you mulch now, you'll have next to no weeding come summer.

- Deadhead bulbs. Remove spent blossoms from spring-flowering bulbs; let foliage die back without removing it.
- Go shopping. Pick out flats of your favorite bedding plants; remember to pick ones not yet in bloom for stronger plants.
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs. Trim away spent blooms, and thin too-thick branches to rejuvenate older plants.

"Old Fashioned Customer Service" : **KAZ Equipment's Joe Kazimir**

If you ask Joe Kazimir ("Joe Kaz" to those who know him) what he enjoys most about running his own business, the answer is clear and unmistakable: working closely with his customers.

Joe and Bob St. Jacques, FSL President, have known each other for a long time. Says Joe: "you couldn't meet a better person-both from a business perspective and a personal one." Although Joe and Bob share some hobbies (motocross, as an example), they share a similar business philosophy as well: treating your customers with great customer service never grows old.
